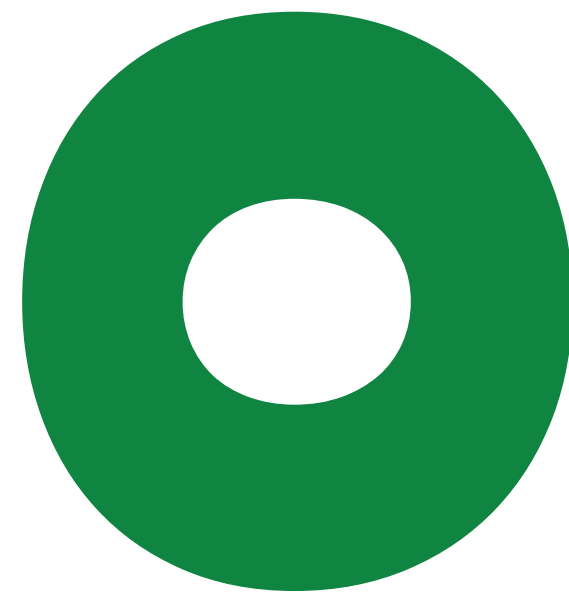

Bluff Heights Neighborhood EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

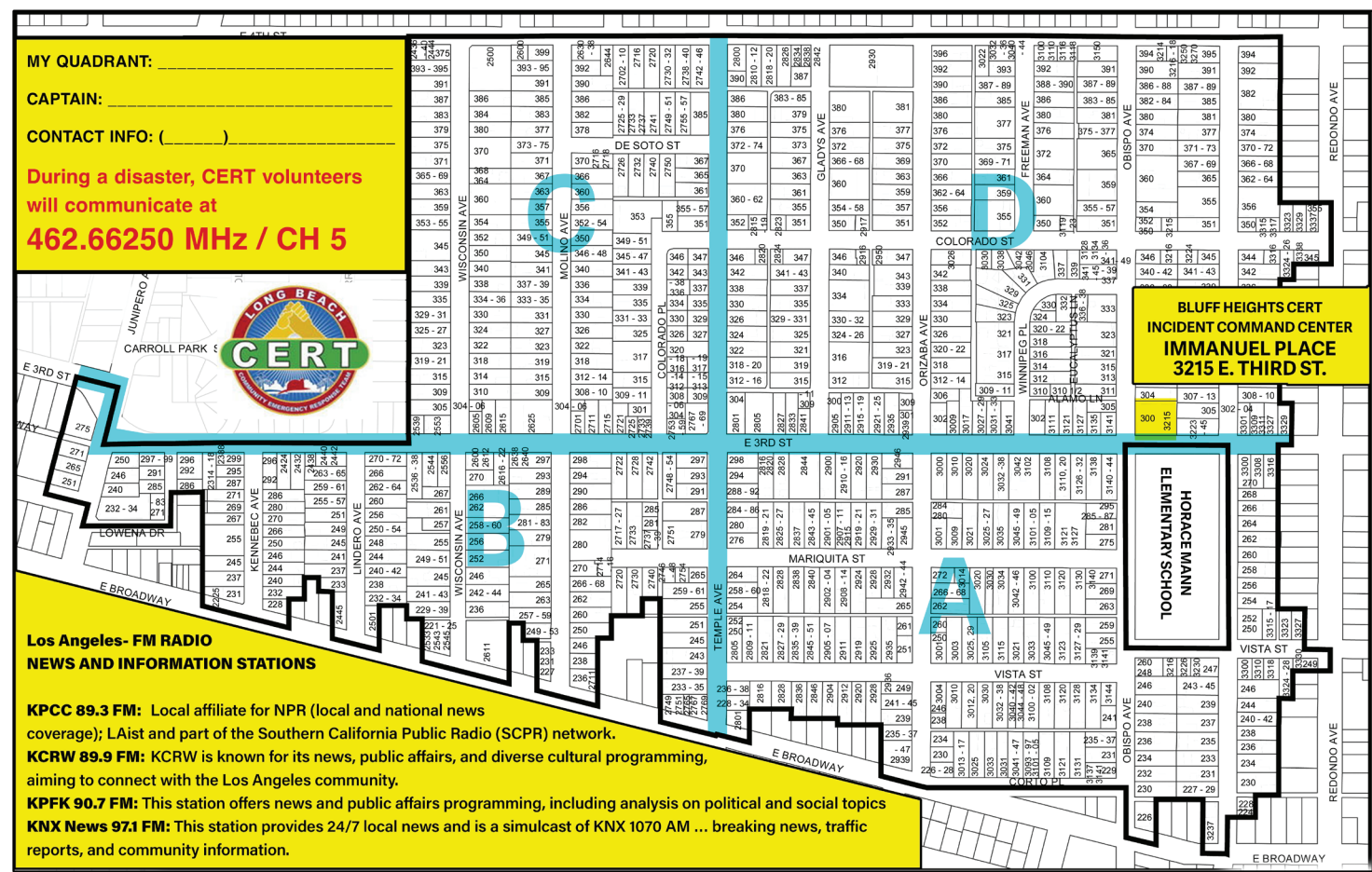
The enclosed resources serve as a guide for individuals, families, and communities to discover ways to keep their people, pets, and property safe in an emergency.



We all can play an important role in emergency planning by preparing ourselves, our family, and neighborhood. This guide will help you discover how you can keep our community safe before, during, and after an emergency – no matter what type of home you have. Using this guide, we can work together to build a more resilient community.

In the event of a larger scale emergency or disaster, Long Beach emergency response resources would likely be overwhelmed and would focus first on infrastructure, hospitals, schools, nursing facilities. In an Emergency our BHNA volunteer CERT Team would be activated and organized to help residents with safety information, search & rescue, traffic and recovery operations. When activated, QUADRANT CAPTAINS and BLOCK LEADERS would survey their respective quadrants and report immediately to our local Incident Command Center located at Immanuel Place (3rd and Obispo). Our CERT Team would conduct an assessment in order to organize and prioritize needs for our Bluff Heights district.

Bluff Heights Historic District



Bluff Heights neighborhood is divided into FOUR (4) QUADRANTS: A, B, C and D.

Quadrants are divided by 3rd Street and Temple as shown in the map with each one assigned a QUADRANT CAPTAIN who is assigned to lead proactive safety management and disaster recovery efforts.

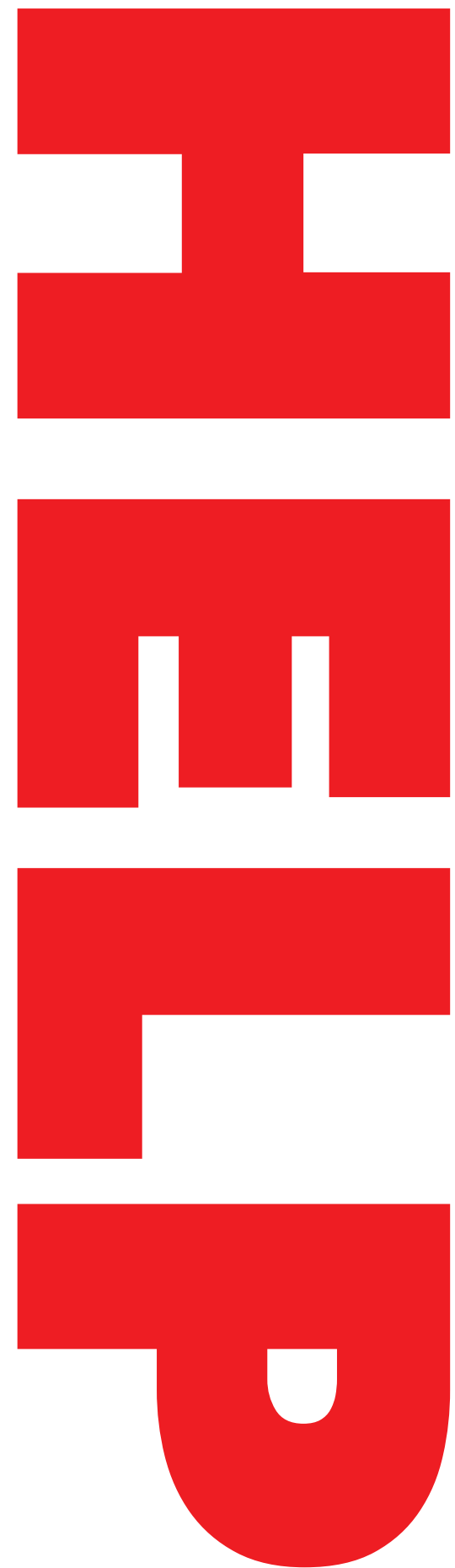
